Audience


The majority of the people that come to central city/ blackhawk are adults, as it is now a gambling town.

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS CEMETERY

The Order of the Odd Fellows was a fraternity that originated in England in the eighteenth century but eventually spread throughout the world. They were a universal brotherhood, bound with the chain of the triple links, Friendship, Love, Truth. A brotherhood that aspired to care for each other when there wasn't any structure in place for the welfare of the people. They wanted to establish a way for men to be able to take care of their families and provide for them in the event of the man's death, like having insurance before insurance was available. The organization still exists in different forms.

CENTRAL CITY CEMETERY

This historic cemetery is the resting place of many of miners and journeymen that aspired to strike it rich in the gold rush as well as those who continued mining when the Gold Mills ran dry, who turned to hard rock mining. This site is not the original location of this cemetery, it was moved during the early 1900's, unwittingly leaving behind some bodies and bringing about the realization that a number of the bodies that had been buried were not dead when they were buried. Scratches and other damage were discovered inside the caskets of a number of plague victims that were assumed dead.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS CEMETERY

The Knights of Pythias was founded in Washington, D.C. on Feb 19, 1864 by Justus H. Rathbone. The organization was inspired by a play written by the Irish poet John Banim about the legend of Damon and Pythias, of which, the main themes are loyalty and friendship. In their Declaration of Principles, they state that these themes are what the fraternity based their core values on: brotherhood, friendship, charity and benevolence. Over the last century and a half, their message spread across the continent as more people moved west in search of the American dream, striking it rich with gold on the frontier.

RED MEN LODGE CEMETERY

The Improved Order of Red Men's roots can be traced back to the 1760s, when it was one of several secret groups such as the Sons of Liberty that formed in the years before the American Revolution. After a meeting at Fort Mifflin near Philadelphia in 1813, several of the still-functioning patriotic groups came together as the Society of Red Men. The name was changed at an 1834 meeting in Baltimore to the Improved Order of Red Men, the name still used today. The Red Men drew many of its rituals and terms from the Iroquois Tribe as a sign of respect, not ridicule.



CATHOLIC CEMTERY


The pioneers of the 19th century and early 20th were predominantly religious, and most of the inhabitants of Central City were as well. This catholic cemetery is almost exclusively the resting place for the town parishioners. The Central City Catholic Cemetery Records, 1879-1928 are kept in the archives of the archdiocese. These records reflect life and death in the mining town.




This would be an interactive monolith that would tell visitors where to find specifc people, a map of the site, and take away maps that can help them orient themselves once they leave this monolith.







